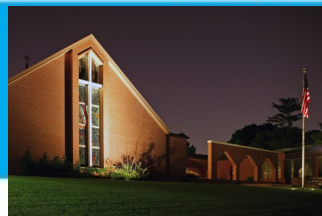

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS:

JANUARY 17, 2019

The Session approved the minutes from the Session retreat on January 5, 2019, and the congregational meeting on November 18, 2018.

The Session acknowledged the e-mail vote to grant approval for the Rev. Adam White, pastor of the Lutheran Center (ELCA) at UNL, to officiate at the baptism of Vienna Rose Dummermuth at the 11 a.m. worship service on December 30, 2018.

The Session elected Robin Hadfield

as Clerk of the Session.

The Session approved the 2019 budget as presented. The budget was revised from the proposed budget discussed in November 2018 to reflect a reduction of \$20,000 from personnel; \$20,000 from the outreach budget; and \$15,000 from per capita. The personnel budget will be reduced by providing no salary increases for the Rev. Jones Poynton and the Rev. Dummermuth; by reducing the Director of Music Ministry to a part-time position effective July 1, 2019; and by eliminating the

maintenance and setup position. Volunteers will be asked to assist with setup, and some maintenance responsibilities will be shifted to the part-time Sunday custodian position.

The Session approved three fundraisers for the Eastridge Pantry: a request for personal hygiene items during Lent; a request for monetary contributions in May; and a request for food items in October.



ANNUAL MEETING INFORMATION:



At this year's annual meeting, the session felt it was important to

share some important information about our 2018 end of year giving drive, as well as our 2019 budget.

Concerning our 2018 financials: Our total general income in 2018 was approximately \$524,000 (\$19,000 of that included memorial gifts), bringing our contributions to the general budget to \$505,000. This created a shortfall in income of \$83,000. We have many theories about why this shortfall may have occurred (new

tax laws, changing patterns in giving), but won't know for sure until the end of the year if those theories hold true. What we do know is that we had fantastic giving in December of 2017, and giving so far in 2019 is encouraging. We did take a loan from ourselves of \$60,000 (which means we did underspend our budget), which we will pay back as funds become available.

A successful stewardship campaign: We are also encouraged with the success of our stewardship campaign. While many churches are moving away from these campaigns, we still find the information valuable in helping us plan for the next fiscal year. This year, we are thrilled to have \$42,000 in new pledges, as well as an increase overall in "repeat"

pledges. In the past, our budget number has been new/increase in pledges plus the previous year's giving. Good stewardship of resources, planning for longevity, and fiscal responsibility lead us to recommend a number of \$550,000 for this year's budget.

The 2019 budget: In November, the session passed a provisional budget of \$605,000. At the beginning of the year, the finance committee and personnel committee both met to make some recommendations to session. At the January meeting, the session debated these recommendations, as well as others, and made the following changes to the 2019 budget:

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Personnel: 1) no increase for pastors, and no increase for staff members; 2) to make a projected $\frac{3}{4}$ time director of music ministry into a $\frac{1}{2}$ time director of music ministry, beginning in July; 3) to eliminate the maintenance and set up position. We do still have a cleaning service that cleans the church, we will be gathering a list of volunteers who are skilled in building repair and able to help with set ups. If funds become available, we would like to move the music position to $\frac{3}{4}$ time. Total change: \$20,000.

Per Capita: Some of us think about this as a “membership fee” to belong to the PC (USA), which is \$45 for our presbytery in 2019. Our total bill continues to hover around \$35,000. These funds go to support ministries in our presbytery, synod, and general assembly, providing for mission, programs, and ministries. We have notified the budget and finance committee that we will be able to pay \$20,000 toward our per capita this year, and urged them to consider lowering per capita in the future. Any monies that were given toward per capita in

2018 were handed on to presbytery. We are asking members to consider giving \$45 above their pledge, if they are able. Total change: \$15,000.

Mission/Outreach: We have always taken our beginnings as a mission church to heart, and designated a substantial percentage of our income to mission. At one time, we gave nearly half the budget in mission to presbytery, synod, and GA,



worldwide mission partners (mission co-workers), local, national, and international organizations. For the past several years, the mission budget has been 10% of anticipated giving, making it around \$57,000. This reduces our mission giving to 5.1%. As has been the case for the past several years, the outreach commit-

tee will determine how these funds are distributed. Total change: \$20,000.

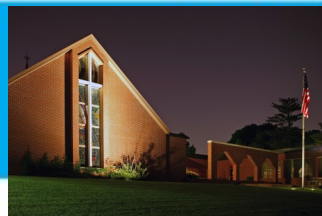
In summary: We are trying to be fiscally responsible and conservative, meeting the changes that are happening in society. At the same time, we want to recognize that we are a thriving, healthy, growing church. Our statistics are encouraging: 29 new members in 2018, growth of 25%

in our children’s ministry, a strong youth ministry, a vibrant music ministry, and growth in our worship attendance in the last quarter of the year. There is excitement, buzz, and happiness at Eastridge. These changes reflect our desire to be good stewards, which includes providing for stability in our near future, as well as thinking outside of

the box for ways to prepare for the distant future as well.

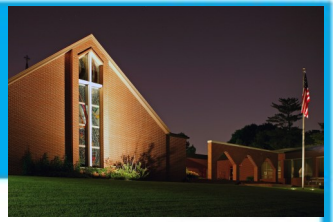

MINISTRY WITH YOUTH

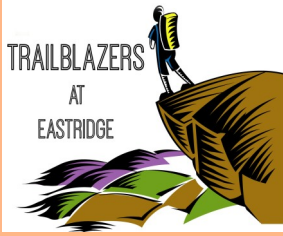
Faith Connection for Youth:

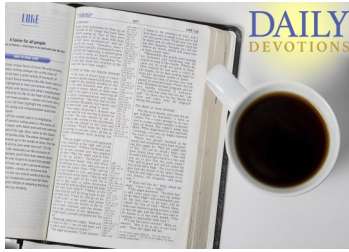
In addition to Youth Sunday on the 3rd, the

Trailblazers for February: On Friday, February 15: Games & Soup Supper. We'll meet at 7:00 PM in the Huxtable Lounge for food and games.







Mayor's Interfaith Breakfast on April 12

Online reservations are now available at lancastrfaith.org for the 35th annual Mayor's Interfaith Prayer Breakfast on April 12. A former police officer and inner-city educator from Milwaukee will speak at the event.

Pardeep Singh Kaleka is with The Forgiveness Project and is co-founder of “Serve2Unite.” Kaleka will share his personal journey to forgiveness after the death of his father in the Sikh Temple shooting near Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in 2012.

The event is co-hosted by Lincoln Mayor Chris Beutler and the Faith Coalition of Lancaster County at Lincoln Station Great Hall, Seventh and P streets. Doors open at 7 a.m., and the program begins at 7:30 a.m. The program also will feature music from the Great Plains Chamber Winds and readings and prayers from a variety of the faith communities in the area.

Kaleka's work specializes in holistic trauma-informed treatment for survivors and perpetrators of assault, abuse and acts of violence. He is the founder of Serve2Unite, which has received the Guru Nanak Award and been recognized by the Parliament of World Religions for its work to build safe, inclusive communities. More information is available at Serve2Unite.org. Kaleka is also the author of “The Gifts of Our Wounds” and is a licensed therapist with D&S Healing Center in Milwaukee.

Individual tickets are \$30, and sponsorships of 10 seats are available for \$300. In the spirit of the event, groups attending together are encouraged to mingle their seating with other groups.

Otto will be preaching both at the 9 and 11 am services, and join us in a time of conversation between the services, as we explore together what the church and the recovery community can learn from each other.
