



### From the Pastor's Pen...

The Book of Revelation is full of wonderful (and sometimes terrifying) imagery that is often associated with the end of the world. Revelation is considered apocalyptic literature, which we have often misinterpreted to mean the end of the world. However, one of the many things I learned in seminary is that apocalypse really refers to the revealing of something, or some-

that's appropriate, especially as I think about all the things these weeks bring – All Saints' Day, Thanksgiving, Advent and Christmas. It's a good reminder for us, as we put away the things of spring and summer, of new and flourishing life; and consider the changing of the seasons. For me, these months always bring me closer to the hope we have in the resurrection, as the time of full growth and harvest pass

thing about someone. In Biblical texts, it is most often a revelation about God and who God is.

I have to confess that most of my favorite hymns are inspired by the texts of Revelation: Jesus Yet she on earth has union with God, the Three in One, and mystic sweet communion with those whose rest is won: O happy ones and holy! Lord, give us grace that we, like them, the meek and lowly, may live eternally." and we must pluck up what has been planted.

Dear friends, I think about you. And I pray for you. As we gather the list of names of those who have passed

Christ is Risen Today; Crown Him with Many Crowns; Blessed Assurance; Love Divine, All Love's Excelling; Now Thank We All Our God; For All the Saints; Shall We Gather at the River; O Come, O Come, Emmanuel; All Creatures of Our God and King; and Holy, Holy, Holy, to name a few.

Over the coming weeks many of these songs will be used in our worship services. I think

since last All Saints' Day, Thomas and I spend time reflecting on their lives and deaths. We spend time remembering home visits and communion, funny stories, meaningful moments, tears that were shared with us, and the hope that we named in your midst. As Jesus told his disciples, "And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also."

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We believe that travelling this journey from life to eternal life with you is a sacred part of our calling. It is a sacred space.

We are on the downhill side of fall and rounding the bend of our Heroes of the Faith sermon series. We began with some heroes from the Old Testament and then moved into Revelation and talked about being a faith hero today. Over the next few weeks, we will have opportunity to talk about the faith of the saints in the church triumphant. I want to share with you the image I have of that church, the church that will be on that great day when every knee will bend and every tongue confess, when the angel choir joins in singing, when the organ and the band play, and the rafters of heaven are

shaking with the joy of the song, and I see my grandparents I did not know long enough in this life, and my spiritual grandmother who walked with my family through tragedy, and the men and women who prayed for me, and yes, all those people we remember at All Saints', and those empty spaces in our pews and at our tables are filled once again, and together we sing, "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty!" That is what I think of this time of year. From All Saints' to Thanksgiving, to the promise of that Advent hope.

This is the promise we proclaim, dear friends. In life and in death, we belong to God, and are members of the church triumphant. Thanks be to God.

#### Witness to the Resurrection

In the Reformed (Presbyterian) tradition, the funeral/memorial service is a worship "service of witness to the resurrection," as well as a celebration of life. When the occasion for these services arise, oftentimes the family and/or loved ones of the deceased are overwhelmed by the many tasks surrounding death.

Whenever I sit with those making these arrangements, I begin with "ordinarily." However, it is important to acknowledge that "ordinarily" very rarely happens, as we try to tailor the service around the wishes of the deceased and their family. This can be once again overwhelming, and it need not be. Here's a few things Thomas and I would like to offer for your consideration:

1) A good place to start is with a list of favorite hymns and scriptures. Some also here include a list of "do not play, sing or read" hymns and scriptures. These may be sung as a congregation, by a soloist, or played before, after, or during the service.

2) If there are poems, sayings, prayers, memories, pictures, etc., that you like, gather them together.

3) Memorial cards with information regarding the service can generally be provided by the funeral home. These are helpful for reference the day of the service and in the years to come. 4) The pastor officiating at the service will meet with the family to go over the details of the service, provide some grief counseling, and communicate with the musician(s), funeral luncheon committee, etc.

We are happy to talk about your wishes in advance and may make some notes. However, we do suggest sharing your wishes with your family verbally and in writing. The church can keep a copy as well, if you would like.

Thank you for asking us to share these sacred spaces and time with you.

During worship on October 13 Eastridge Presbyterian Church confirmed our designation as a **PCUSA Covenanting Hunger Action Congregation.** The Hunger Action Board is pleased to provide background regarding this designation.

About 5 years ago, the Eastridge Outreach Committee was facing some budget cuts, and at the same time receiving countless additional requests for financial support for a huge variety of organizations and programs. How were we to decide how to allocate our funds? A process of examining the mission and outreach commitments of the Eastridge congregation led

us to identify what we called three areas of passion for EPC. Those areas are Education and Evangelism, Home and Opportunity, and Food and Hunger. These passions are now central to the decisions made by the Outreach Committee.

About the same time we were doing that, it became

apparent that the work and management of the Eastridge Pantry had expanded beyond the work of the pantry distribution director, so a Food Pantry Board was established. Since that time, the discussions of the Outreach Committee and the Food Pantry Board often overlapped and it became challenging to know who was coordinating what. Eastridge is involved in so many hunger ministries! So many in fact, that nearly every member has participated and/or financially supported one or more of them at some point in time: perhaps you delivered Meals on Wheels, donated food or other items to the pantry, filled bags for Kids Against Hunger, donated money to the Pantry, filled snack bags for the homeless, purchased

Lefler mobile pantry, filled backpacks, participated in the Super Bowl of Caring, walked in the Crop Walk, etc. The list goes on. You are busy caring people, humbly feeding others! Knowing this, when the former Food Pantry Board

PCUSA Hunger Action Congregation, they thought pursuing this designation was fitting with Eastridge's passions. What is a Hunger Action Congregation, you might ask?

The purpose of the Hunger Action Congregation process is to:

(1) acknowledge and cele-

brate the faithful work of Presbyterians happening around the country to alleviate hunger and end its causes, and

(2) to encourage these ministries to be even more holistic and justice-oriented.

The EPC Food Pantry Board started by seeking approval from the Session to become the Hunger Action Board, which would have oversight of all of our hunger outreach programs and activities, and also to begin the process of applying for this designation, which involves describing your involvement in 6 areas.

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HELP FOR THE HUNGRY







**Ending Hunger and Its Causes:** Six Areas

Hunger Alleviation: providing and/ or sharing food in a dignified way with an eye to long-term structural solutions

**Development assistance:** addressing the root causes of hunger and poverty through equitable and sustainable development

Hunger Education: learning about systemic causes of hunger, leading towards faithful action that is informed and directed by directly affected people and partners

**Lifestyle Integrity:** adopting sustainable personal and corporate lifestyles to restore justice and protect all of God's creation

**Corporate and Public Policy Witness:** advocating and campaigning for changes in policies and practices to end hunger and its causes, promote self-development, and care for creation

**Worship:** incorporating prayer, education, and preaching about end-

ing hunger and its causes into worship.

If an applying congregation demonstrates involvement in 1-5 of these areas, it can be designated a Covenanting Hunger Action Congregation. If you demonstrate in activity in all 6 areas, it can be designated a Certified Hunger Action Congregation. Each designation in good for three years.

Upon completion, our application demonstrated strong involvement in 4 areas, somewhat less in the the area of development assistance, and very little in the Corporate and Public Policy Witness. We applied to be a Covenanting Congregation, and agreed we would work to attain the Certified designation during the next years, and that work is already happening.

This is not a merit badge, whose requirements have been met and a badge sewn permanently to our sash, but rather a covenant, acknowledging our work and committing to continue in our efforts to address hunger locally and globally. 



fer, it can be ordered from a local bookseller as well. Other versions we use are: the NRSV; The Jewish Annotated New Testament by Amy-Jill Levine and Mark Z. Brettler; and The New Testament: A Translation by David Bentley Hart.

#### SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

#### **SEPTEMBER 2019**

The Session acknowledged the baptism of Barrett Blake Meyers, born January 4, 2019, son of Avery and Blake Meyers, on September 8, 2019, at the 9 a.m. worship service.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Dr. John Duling officiated at the memorial service of Shannon Pike Gocke on September 6, 2019, at Eastridge.

The Session approved plans to proceed with a new congregational pictorial directory.

The Session approved the recommendation of the Worship Commission to schedule one service of worship on November 10, 2019, at 10 a.m., to be followed by the congregational meeting called to elect officers and to approve the terms of call of the pastoral staff. The meeting will be followed by the Annual Thanksgiving Dinner.

The Board of Deacons reported that 56 people attended the ice cream social. A church family event is planned at Martin Orchard near Ceresco, Nebraska, in October.

The Worship Commission reported that a piano subcommittee has discussed options and will request estimates for repairs.

#### OCTOBER 2019

The Session received Kate and Justin Gibson into membership by letter of transfer from Redeemer Lutheran Church, Lincoln, Nebraska.

The Session will recommend to the congregation,

with regret, no increase in the pastors' compensation for 2020.

The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of September 19, 2019.

The Session affirmed that communion was served at the 9 and 10:30 a.m. services on October 6, 2019.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Thomas Dummermuth officiated at the wedding of Sarah Arellano and Brandon Rogers on October 6, 2019.



The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Dr. Melodie Jones Pointon officiated at the funeral service of Donald Grieser on October 12, 2019.

The Session received notice from Homestead Presbytery that the per capita for 2020 is \$45.10, and the total is \$34,546.60, based on membership of 766 in 2018.

The Learn Commission reported that additional volunteers are needed in order to maintain current programming or

to provide more programming for children and youth.

The Session approved a youth fundraiser in cooperation with 10,000 Villages. The store will host a Christmas shopping event at Eastridge on November 17, 18, and 19, 2019, to be staffed by youth and volunteers. Eastridge will receive 15 percent of the proceeds. This fundraiser will replace a previously approved vendor fair.

The Worship and Music Advisory Committee is seeking additional coordinators for communion and additional liturgists. There will be no cantata this year, but music will be emphasized during Advent services.



#### We Need YOU!

Even though we have started our education year, we could still use some additional folks to help with our children and youth programs.

**Preschool teachers (3yr – 5yr olds)** – we can use three additional folks that will teach/assist in the preschool class on Sunday mornings. This is a once a month commitment during the 10:30am service. The children remain in worship through the Worship Connection and then go to the class.

**Tuesday Afterschool Program teachers (Kindergarten – 5th grade)** – we can use three to five additional teachers for the classroom portion of our afternoon program. By add-

ing three to five adults, this could be a bi-monthly commitment. Three Tuesdays a month it would the time commitment would be 4:00pm to 5:15pm and the four Tuesday it would be 3:15pm – 5:15pm.

**Tuesday Afterschool Program snacks** – we have a good stash of snack for the next 6 weeks or so but could use some additional items. We could now

use some gift cards so we can provide fresh fruits and veggies each week.

**Youth Group dinners** – we can use volunteers that would be willing to provide dinner for the youth group. Dinner is at 5:30pm and is served for 25-30 people. This could be done by individuals or could be done by a group. We would also love to have you stay and eat dinner with us so we can get to know you.

Acolyte assistants - each Sunday morning we like

to have an acolyte at each service. In order to help them prepare and get down the aisle at the right time, we could use a volunteer that will help them. It does not

require additional time other than attending worship. We could use at least one or two volunteers at each service.
