### Who is GiFT for?

Literally for everyone. Meaning: for youth, singles, couples, moms and dads, college students, teenagers, kids, grandmas and grandpas, empty nesters, newcomers, working people, retired people, people with pets, and for those without. In short: for everyone (did we say that already?).

### <sup>Dig</sup> What are the goals of GiFT?

GiFT reclaims God's intent for faith to be shared in community and across generations. Through an experience of learning together, sharing faith, praying together, serving and celebrating rituals and traditions, GiFT helps connect families and individuals who want to spend more quality time together. GiFT builds relationships between the generations and across the congregation. By sharing our faith stories and learning from each other, we **Grow in Faith Together**.

### What does a GiFT event look like?

GiFT takes place on the first Wednesday each month. A GiFT event begins at 5:30 pm with a joint dinner and a time of fellowship in the fellowship hall. At the heart of a GiFT evening is a fun interactive experience that centers around milestones of our lives, and engages all ages. GiFT also offers practical tools to nurture the faith of families and individuals in our daily lives.





## Creating Advent: A Worship and Craft Workshop








## **Advent Studies:**

#### SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

#### **NOVEMBER 21, 2019**

The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of September 19, 2019, and the congregational meeting of November 10, 2019.

The Session affirmed that communion was served at the 9 and 10:30 a.m. services on November 3, 2019.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Dr. Melodie Jones Pointon officiated at the funeral service of Mary Urbom on November 2, 2019.

The Session provisionally approved the concept for the Sunrise Road properties, as recommended by the Sunrise Road Property Committee. The provisional approval will allow the committee to apply for grants in the upcoming grant cycle.

The Session approved a one-day retreat for January 11, 2020, in conjunction with partner churches. The focus of the retreat will be the Enneagram. The Session approved the request from the Youth Committee to begin offering the SCRIP program as a fundraising vehicle for youth activities. The pop-up fundraiser with Ten Thousand Villages was successful, and the Session approved sponsoring it again in 2020.

Rev. Thomas Dummermuth reported that one of the highlights of his month was becoming a U.S. citizen in a ceremony in Omaha, Nebraska, on November 12, 2019.

Kris Adler-Brammer reported on her activities and stated that a continuing concern is sufficient volunteers for the various programs.

Brian Lew reported on his activities, including noting that the Kirk Handbell Ringers led worship at the Lutheran Center.

The Worship Commission reported that plans are underway for a pictorial directory and that online signups will begin in the next two weeks. Photos will be taken on January 14, 15, and 16, 2020. Thanks were offered to Pam Schumacher for her leadership for the Thanksgiving Dinner, which was a success.

The Outreach Committee reported that it approved sending \$500 from the emerging needs fund to the South Sudan, which has been affected by recent flooding.

The Hunger Action Board reported that 871 pounds of food were returned as part of the Thirty Days of Thanks food drive. Thanks were given to the congregation for the contributions.

A new member class is scheduled for December 8, 2019, at 11:30 a.m.

Rev. Dummermuth reported on the Homestead Presbytery meeting. Presbytery celebrated the 150th anniversaries of four churches. The Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Committee is planning work camps for next year in the regions affected by flooding. It is also asking congregations to consider their disaster preparedness plans.
