



From the Pastor's Pen...

There's a song we sing at our 10:30 am service that has been running through my mind since the beginning of the year. Of course, my favorite version is done by our band, but I've learned to also love the Kutless version. It's called "King of My Heart." I love it not only for its melody, but also because of the words, "Let the King of my heart... Be the moun-

tain where I run/The fountain I drink from/Oh He is my song. Let the King of my heart/Be the shadow where I hide/The ransom for my life/Oh He is my song."


For various reasons, though, I've been having some trouble with the bridge, "You are good, good, oh," repeated several times.

We tend to plan ahead around here. Sometimes we plan up to six months or more ahead. Our planning for this winter is indicative of what we were feeling at the time, that we (Thomas and I)

were individually wanting to spend some time focusing on our spiritual health. So we made arrangements for the Enneagram retreat with Patty Forsberg, planned out the Unraveled sermon and worship series, and prayed that our congregation would be receptive to this kind of spirituality laid bare in our souls. At this point, we've heard from many of you that this desire we have been feeling is

in your heart, too.

All of it runs together for me, as I admit to you all that there are definitely times that the words from this bridge get stuck in my throat. I think it's meant to be praise, and I find it hard to sing "You are good, good" when I see and experience hurt in myself and in others. So I researched the origin of this song, its writer, and its story. It was written by



This brought to mind something else I read recently, from pastor and author Carol Howard Merritt in her book, "Healing Spiritual Wounds." She reflects on Hosea 6:1, "Come, let us return to the Lord; for it is God who has torn, and God will heal us; God has struck down, and God will bind us up." (continued on following page)





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She says, "I can't cram those words into any sort of neat and tidy theological system. They aren't meant to be a divine explanation of who God is; rather, the poetry reflects the cry of an imperfect people. The words give voice to the broken bitterness people feel when wounded, even as they articulate a hope in a God who heals, a God who knows how to clean out the bleeding gashes and bind the lacerations securely enough so that they could recover properly. God has torn. God will heal."

As I reflect on what this means for us as individuals and as a congregation, I find myself wanting to say, "God sees you. God sees your hurts and your failures. God sees your joys and your successes. God sees your struggles. God sees your triumphs." I believe the spiritual work we have engaged in this season will bear spiritual fruit as we find ourselves spiritually unraveled and real before our God and each other. Like Howard Merritt, I can't explain my faith in this God who tears down and builds up. I can only share the truth I have discovered... that the only healing for my heart is to "Let the King of my heart be the mountain where I run, the fountain I drink from, the shadow where I hide, the ransom for my life."

May God bless us all, as we continue to be unraveled and seek the shalom found in God.

What are the goals of GiFT?

GiFT reclaims God's intent for faith to be shared in community and across generations. Through an experience of learning together, sharing faith, praying together, serving and celebrating rituals and traditions, GiFT helps connect families and individuals who want to spend more quality time together. GiFT builds relationships between the generations and across the congregation. By sharing our faith stories and learning from each other, we **Grow in Faith Together**.

What does a GiFT event look like?

GiFT takes place on the first Wednesday each month. A GiFT event begins at 5:30 pm with a joint dinner and a time of fellowship in the fellowship hall. At the heart of a GiFT evening is a fun interactive experience that centers around milestones of our lives, and engages all ages. GiFT also offers practical tools to nurture the faith of families and individuals in our daily lives.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS For January

The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of December 19, 2019.

The Session affirmed that communion was served at the 9 and 10:30 a.m. services on January 5, 2020.

The Session approved the request of the Worship Commission to schedule a single service at 10 a.m. on Youth Sunday, February 2, 2020.

The Session approved the request of the Worship Commission to collect a "noisy offering" on the fifth Sunday of any month (March, May, August, November). In addition to the regular offering, change will be collected in tin containers and the funds will be used to support the choral scholars.

The Session approved the 2020 budget as amended.

The Board of Trustees reported that an insurance claim has been submitted for the power surge which caused damage to the organ.

Worship Volunteers Needed: Communion Preparers

As the Old English proverb says, "Many hands make light work." For those who have been preparing our congregational communion over the years, just a few hands have done most of the work. We are asking for more volunteers to help with communion preparation, which primarily involves: cutting the bread (at your home); bringing it Sunday morning in the 8:00 hour and putting it on the communion plates; pouring the juice into cups or carafes (depending on which service); and clean up afterwards. Someone else arranges and schedules the communion servers. Further, someone else purchas-

es the bread and the juice. Finally, most of the cleanup can occur after the 9:00 service because at the 10:30 service, the pastors distribute communion by intinction (and fewer dishes are involved). We


currently have three volunteers who are among those few who have been doing this work for many, many years. We would like three more volunteers. With six total volunteers, each person would be responsible for 2 months. January and February are taken care of, so we would like to have the new volunteers in place before the first Sunday in March. To volunteer, please contact Donna in the office. FROM PASTOR JOHN DULING:

In support of the recent retreat that • the congregation had on the Enneagram, I would like to devote some columns for suggested spiritual practices that could help one claim and nurture their Enneagram type. What I would suggest is to enter into dialog or open oneself to what God's Holy Spirit would clarify about each person's type. This column will suggest that one discover what journaling could provide as a prayerful exercise of discernment and openness to one's type. Even if one does not choose to consider their Enneagram type, journaling is a good exercise for • anyone.

Here are some very general suggestions for this exercise:

- Begin with silence. The appropriate timing for one's silence is very personal. Some could begin their day with journaling or conclude their day with journaling. The time of silence could be a minute or as many as 3 or 5 • minutes. Silence the world noise and let God's Spirit direct this silent time.
- Look up a daily devotional such as the church's devotion found on the website or from one's de- • votional guide like Upper Room or These Days. Another idea is to react to the challenges of the Sunday sermon from Pastors Find:enneathought@enneagraminsti Melodie or Thomas. God has an tute.com

sources.

- When one feels ready, begin can be a great quide. writing in a journal or some pad ite easy chair, bed, or desk. The Associate style of writing is as varied as one's desire. Some have written poetry. Others have written a diary-like entry of how they feel God is working in their lives. I write a "Dear God" letter. It is a written letter prayerfully seeking what God would have me do or consider for the day. I find that my time to journal is best in the morning.
- How much one writes is very personal – short paragraphs or pages. No limits. It is letting you express your feelings to God.
- Next, when one is done, take time to listen for God or nudges or impressions or thoughts that hit. Note any questions, words, or phrases. Those are God inspired.
- How this may be of support to one's Enneagram type is permitting one to open up to God through some form of devotion. Journaling is a good means to do that.
- I conclude with a suggested devotional website and email that one may connect to for further reflection.




Presbyterian Pilgrimage to be March 26 - 29 at Calvin Crest




