FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN:

I've been thinking a lot about promises and blessings recently. My children have helped, with their protests of "But mom, you promised!" as well as a newfound insistence on a "blessing before every meal, mom!" Maybe these things were on my mind when I considered the scripture texts and themes for this upcoming year. Noah and the rainbow, Abraham and the fiery pillar, parted seas, eagle's wings, all symbols of God's promise and blessing for God's people.

The form of government of the PC(USA) gives 1/3 of itself to the Directory for Worship. This is a good indication of how important worship is and should be for our community. Through its pages we learn how com-

munities have and still do worship. A part of that directory says this: "Certain biblical images have come to have deeper significance, multiple associations, and lasting meaning for the people of God. We call these symbols. There are numerous examples in the Old Testament—tree, temple, rainbow, river, sheep, scroll, building, body. New Testament writers drew on this

treasury of common meaning to convey their understanding of Christ, the gospel, the Church, and the realm of God. Certain prominent symbols from Scripture, such as light, book, water, bread, cup, and cross, play an important role in Christian worship. Such things are not objects to be worshiped, but signs that point to the "grace of God in Jesus Christ." Or, put another way, throughout the Biblical witness, God has given God's people signs and symbols as reminders of God's promise and God's blessing for all those whom God loves.

This is a comfort to me, as I consider the great heroes of my faith - the Abrahams and Sarahs, the Moseses and Miriams, the Deborahs and Davids, the Marys and

Josephs, the Pauls and Phoebes. All of these faithful whose stories we still learn and lean on today, needed signs and symbols to remind them of God's promise and blessing. When I am uncertain or afraid (with a deep breath), I begin to breathe again and look for that reminder.

As a community, we have been busy planning and preparing for our fall ministries. With the decrease in pandemic restrictions at the beginning of the summer, we looked to the many possibilities of what we would be able to do. Yes, we have compared it to last year - last year we couldn't, this year we can - with relief and excitement. However, with the recent increase in numbers and changing Covid risk dial for our community, we took a pause on our plans. As the head of staff, I

realized that my previously longed-for finality of a "go date" for life to look predictable and familiar was unrealistic.
This internal deadline became unrealistic, as once again I learned that lesson of the past 18 months. Nothing is final; nothing is predictable, nothing is certain. Nothing, that is, except God's promise and God's blessing.

In the pages of this annual special edition of the newsletter, you will find the plans for our ministries for this upcoming ministry year. We are excited to have many of our gathering opportunities return - Bible studies, children and youth ministries, knitting groups, fellowship groups, coffee groups, choirs, serving at the food pantry, food market, Gathering Place, and Meals on Wheels. We have planned, paused, considered, prayed, and made every effort to keep the community safe while participating in these ministries. The leaders of all these ministries have paid thoughtful, prayerful, informed attention to the different options and possibilities available. They are creative and determined people, and I am honored to serve with all of them!

In Lincoln, Nebraska, over 5% of young children live in households with income less breadfortheworld than half of the poverty level (source: www.city-data.com/

poverty/poverty-Lincoln-Nebraska.html).

The Child Tax Credit, introduced in 1998, provides support for low- and middle-income families to help them afford the everyday expenses of raising children. As part of the \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan, Congress passed and President Biden signed a one-year expansion of the Child Tax Credit (CTC), making it available to all low-income families with children. Before the expansion, an estimated 27 million children under age 17 lived in families who did not earn enough to qualify for the full CTC because they did not have sufficient taxable income. The latest version of CTC also increases benefits to \$3600/yr for each child under age 6 and \$3000/yr for each child age 6

to 17. (Benefits are reduced when a household's Adjusted Gross Income exceeds \$150k for a married couple or \$75k for an individual.)

This is a refundable tax credit, which means that if a couple with an eight-year-old has a federal income tax bill of \$5000, then they owe \$2000, while if their tax bill is only \$2000 then they receive \$1000 from the IRS in the form of monthly payments.

The CTC could do more to reduce hunger and poverty among our nation's children than any single policy has in decades: it has been estimated that maintaining the expanded CTC would reduce child poverty in the U.S by 50%.

But the expansion is scheduled to expire at the end of this year. Please write Sens. Fischer and Sasse and Rep. Fortenberry urging them to make the current CTC permanent!

OPPORTUNITY TO HELP RESTOCK THE EASTRIDGE FOOD PANTRY

Hopefully everyone knows that the newly renovated, handicapped-accessible Eastridge Food Pantry re-opened a few weeks ago. We have been slowly rebuilding our clientele base over the past few weeks. It feels really good to be distributing food and personal care items again because the need has probably expanded during the pandemic.

We need your help to restock the pantry. This congregation has always been very generous and we thank you but need your help again. During the pandemic and construction project, we had to disperse almost all of the stock that existed in the pantry. So, we re-opened to nearly bare shelves. Much of our food comes from the Food Bank. However, at this time, the selection from the Food Bank is limited as they are not currently able to accept private donations of food because they have not yet been allowing volunteers to sort those donations. We want to provide a greater selection of food items to our clients. We could make very good use of any of the items listed below that you might wish to provide. There is a shopping cart in the Welcome Center where you can place items for the Pantry. We have an ample supply of certain items that we are able to get from the Food Bank but need the following:

Canned fruit – all types

Canned peas

Canned tomatoes – all types

Canned mixed vegetables

Canned tuna

Any and all types of breakfast items (hot or cold cereal, breakfast bars, pancake mix, etc.)

Jam or jelly

Condiments (ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise, etc.)

Baking supplies (esp. flour and sugar)

If you have extra items from your garden, we would accept those also although it is best to bring them on Sunday just before distribution so that they do not spoil.

Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of June 17, 2021, and the special Session meeting of June 13, 2021.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Dr. Melodie Jones Pointon officiated at the memorial service for Donna Christopherson on June 26, 2021, at Roper and Sons Funeral Home.

The Session acknowledged new members: Christian Beard by pro-

fession of faith; Kevin James by certificate of transfer from Fellowship Community Church, Lincoln, NE; Betty and Arlen Beam by certificate of transfer from Westminster Presbyterian Church, Lincoln, NE; and Deborah Reichert by certificate of transfer from Free German Reformed Salem Church in Sutton, NE.

The Session acknowledged approval by e-mail for the baptism of Hayden Bouwens, daughter of Erin and Jesse Bouwens, at the 9 a.m. service on July 18, 2021.

The Session acknowledged approval by e-mail of request for transfer of membership for Lloyd and Kay Castner from the Federated Church

of Columbus (PCUSA/UCC).

The Session discussed the effect of the pandemic on the church and the plans to respond to those effects as the church returns to previous activities.

Rev. Jones Pointon provided an oral report and discussed staff plans for fall. Rev. Dummermuth provided an oral report on his activities in the last month. He noted that he has

been helping with plans to reopen the Food Pantry.





In response to the recent rise in COVID-19 cases and the continued progression of our community risk dial toward the mid-orange level, the session unanimously adopted the following motions at the regular meeting on August 19, 2021:

- * To require masks in the church buildings.
- * To rename the Building and Property Re-opening Committee to the Health and Safety Committee.




