G.R.O.W. A GARDEN

Gather, Reflect, or Wander

We're announcing the next phase in the Sunrise Road Property Project! Last October we celebrated the completion of the addition to the Food Pantry and installation of an accessible ramp. Now we are developing a reflection garden immediately north of the church building. To remediate water runoff into the basement, the driveway was removed, giving us the opportunity to idevelop a welcoming green space in its place. Plans include installing TREX benches (made from recycled plastic) and a strolling path surrounded by native shrubs and plantings to create a calming natural community space.

Work will begin this Spring! There are many opportunities for members of all ages to contribute. Here's how:

Fighting hunger...Addressing systemic racism...
Increasing congregational vitality

Spring is a time for planting, growing, and building. The birds return to their nests that have been battered by the cold and winds of winter; they hurry to find sticks and lint to rebuild their homes before the eggs are laid. As the ground warms, it becomes welcoming to the seeds and bulbs we plant with visions of colorful gardens. Having lived most of her life in Nebraska's unpredictable weather, my mother always advised, "Don't plant flowers until after Mother's Day." This belief ensured that plants were always included in her Mother's Day gifts.

As Spring heralds a fresh start, it is a good time to consider building our

congregational vitality. After the gray, seemingly unending winter, our congregation has the opportunity to redirect ourselves to demonstrate our beliefs on a daily basis. The PCUSA Vital Congregations guide says, "What we believe: ...God is calling the Church to transform and transcend cultures and contexts. We must move from

inward institutions to neighborhood relationships and mission."

The Food Pantry is an impactful mission serving our community. Completing the addition in October 2021 helped improve the efficiency of food distribution and the capac-

ity to reach out to more people who are food insecure. The ramp made the Pantry more accessible to visitors. As we expand this outreach into our community, a plan has been developed to enhance the welcoming atmosphere near the Pantry by developing a garden north of the church building. It will provide a place for members of the congregation and the broader community to gather, reflect, or wander among native plantings. Benches made from recycled plastic bags will offer quiet spots to pray, listen, and nurture relationships.

A Matthew 25 Congregation is vital, lively, and full of energy. By building our garden, a place to G.R.O.W. (gather ,reflect, and wander), we reach

out to the neighbors living in cultures and contexts that may be unfamiliar, but bring opportunities to transform and transcend our diversity. For information about how you can help G.R.O.W. the Garden, see other articles in this newsletter.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS: APRIL

The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of March 24, 2022.

The Session removed Betty Casper from the member rolls, deceased on March 22, 2022.

The Session removed Lee Hitt from the member rolls, deceased April 7, 2022.

The Session affirmed the e-mail vote approving the baptism of Wyatt Cole Vonderschmidt, son of Nicole and Cole Vonderschmidt, for May 15, 2022, at the 10:30 a.m. service.

The Session affirmed the e-mail vote approving the reguest for Eastridge to host an event on June 26, 2022, at 3 p.m. marking the release of a new book by Mary Pipher. The book, "A Life in Light: Meditations on Impermanence," will be released on June 28, 2022.

The Session approved motions related to the project to

complete landscaping of the former driveway immediately north of the building. The cost will not exceed \$20,000. The church will enter into an agreement with the City of Lincoln to construct a bioswale with matching funds of \$2,000 from the City. The church will participate in the Trex Recycling Program to obtain benches for the garden area. A fundraising plan was also approved.

The Session approved a sabbatical for the Rev. Thomas Dummermuth for July 18, 2022, to August 28, 2022. (The original sabbatical planned for 2020 was delayed due to COVID.)

Eastridge will host a citywide Bible study on May 17, 2022, at 6 p.m. The study will be on Amos and "Justice in Our City."



Churches Respond to the Tragedy in Ukraine

"(God) shall judge between the nations and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore." (Isaiah 2:4)

As the violence in Ukraine continues, the number of people being displaced internally and fleeing to neighboring countries increases by the day. But in the midst of the chaos, there are sibling churches and ecumenical partners who are already providing assistance with basic items for survival. The first priority of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is to provide funding to these partners on the ground. Their response will include both financial and technical assistance as the network of faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the months ahead.

GIVE: To support PDA's emergency relief for those fleeing Ukraine, write a check to Eastridge Presbyterian Church, with "Ukraine" in the memo line.

ACT: Urge the U.S. government to support aid for refugees and civilians suffering in Ukraine, and call for a diplomatic solution to the conflict.

PRAY: May we all, even as we breathe in lament, breathe out mercy, hope and peace.

Choral Concert and Fundraiser for Ukraine: Monday, March 28 at 7:30 p.m. at Nebraska Wesleyan University's Rogers Center for Fine Arts. Free and open to the public.

NWU's Jazz Choir and University Choir will be joined on the O'Donnell Auditorium stage by children from the Nebraska Children's Choir and cast members of Wesleyan's upcoming spring opera. The eclectic program will include jazz standards; hymns and anthems from diverse faith traditions; choral arrangements by Sweet Honey in the Rock; Jake Runestad's choral masterwork "A Silence Haunts Me"; opera arias; and African American spiritu-

als. We will invite those attending to join us in communal song at the concert as well. At times like these, we all need to sing.

Donations collected at the event will go to supporting humanitarian aid in Ukraine through the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR)-- a nonprofit 501(c) 3 organization that responds to numerous disasters each year.

How to Handle Covid Fatigue? Just Learn To WRAP ®

Everyone today has Covid Fatigue: Everyone. Even if no one in their family has had

Covid... even if they didn't lose a job ... even if they can ignore its divisive politics ... They have Covid Fatigue. It has downgraded everyone's mental wellness. Everyone. The data show it and our personal experience says it's true. Nearly 1 in 5 adults received some form of mental health therapy in 2020.

What can we do? People of faith are called to care for others and for ourselves. We're not mental health therapists. And yet... we can make a difference.

We can learn to WRAP. Wellness Recovery Action Planning is a powerful set of tools to help us care for others and ourselves. It is an evidence-based practice. An 8-hour seminar is not a magic solution, but it can be a major positive step. Participants in WRAP training create a personalized system of wellness tools and action plans. It helps people use sound mental health and spiritual principles

to achieve a self-directed wellness vision that manages life's daily challenges. People use these tools for a life-time.
