


Join us as we welcome bestselling author Mary Pipher to Eastridge Presbyterian Church for a

Building congregational vitality... Dismantling structural racism... Eradicating systemic poverty

A vital congregation is culturally relevant; they have figured how to speak to their mission field. They know who they are trying to reach and have the tools for reaching that population. Instead of being judgmental about the current realities, i.e. "Why don't families come

to worship together," we need to find creative ways to use the culture around us to attract participants. Blaming the culture because it has changed often becomes an excuse to give up and die. Yet, we still need to have standards as people of faith, not just be molded by the culture. Rather, it means we are willing to understand and use cultural doorways to help us reach out and be heard. We don't have to throw out the theological standards of our traditions. We allow the culture to inform how we make tactical decisions. Our theology gives us our large quiding principles; tactics allow us to speak to the culture around us. We can be mission-driven, but we need hands-on projects to engage folks in a culturally sensitive way. Reaching out into the variety of cultures n our community can include:

G.R.O.W. a garden: Gather, Reflect, or Wander: We're announcing the next phase in the Sunrise Road Property Project! Last October we celebrated the completion of the addition to the Food Pantry and installation of an accessible ramp. Now we are developing a reflection garden immediately north of the church building. Plans include installing TREX benches (made from recycled plastic) and a strolling path surrounded by native shrubs and plantings to create a calming natural community space. Here's

how to contribute: 1) Collect plastic bags and bring them to the collection boxes in the Welcome Center. 2) Divide the blooming and edible perennials in your garden and donate them to the garden; call the church office to add your name to the plant contributor list. 3) Fund an item on the Garden Wish List*; this would be the ideal honor for a Mother's Day or Father's Day gift.
