



FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN...

The Psalms begin: "The truly happy person...love[s] the Lord's Instruction, and they recite God's Instruction day and night! They are like a tree replanted by streams of water, which bears fruit at just the right time and whose leaves don't fade..."*

Grounded.

For many of us who live in Lincoln, Nebraska, it is a source of some pride that we live in a Tree City, USA. For those of us living in the Great Plains, trees are vitally important for our soil, vegetation, shade, and life in general. As pioneers traveled west and began settling and farming, they noticed the lack of trees. So in 1872, Nebraska City held the first Arbor Day, a day designated for the planting of trees. These trees were practical, providing shade and windbreaks, nourishing the soil, and providing leafy vegetation and fruit. Maybe that's why I feel a connection with the opening verses of the Psalms. Grounded.

Planted by streams of water. Bearing fruit at the right time. Leaves that don't fade. Trees.

Trees play an important role in the story of humanity's relationship with the God that creates, redeems, and renews. We begin with the tree of life in Genesis, and end with the tree of life in Revelation. There are trees that bear fruit, trees that do not; trees that are planted, trees that are uprooted; trees that provide shade, trees that wither in the sun; trees that hold life, and trees bring death; limbs that are pruned, and limbs that are engrafted into already sturdy trees.

As we began to think about the coming year, study-

ing the stories of trees in scripture seemed to fit where we are spiritually as a congregation and community. If we think about the church as a tree, we find that two years of uncertainty has led to some pruning of ministries and connections. At the same time, we see shoots of new growth as we have found ways to continue to connect and grow together. Some of our tree limbs are heavy laden with fruit and some have leaves that are changing. Looking to the future, I find myself grateful for the strong grounded-ness of this community of faith in the God that creates, redeems and renews. It is my prayer that our roots would continue to reach deep into the soil of God's nourishing care for us, and finding ways to be connected to other grounded communities.

Just as trees grow toward the sun, it is my prayer that we, too, would grow toward the Son.

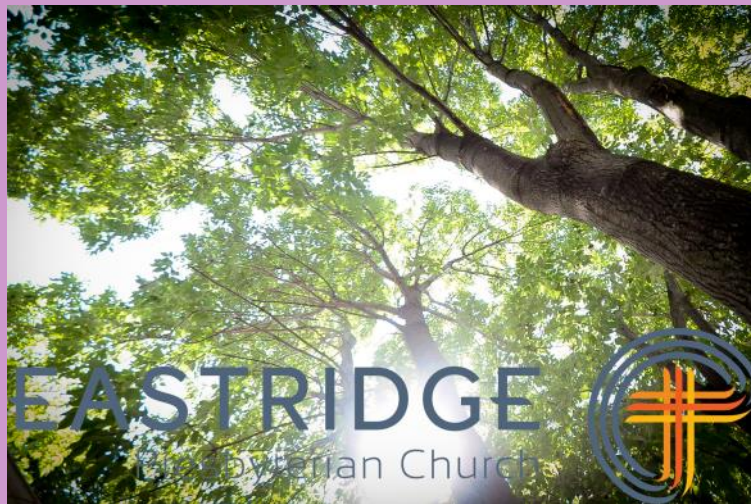
We are excited for the many offerings and opportunities that we are planning and pray for the growth of our community. Inside these pages you will find information for all sorts of ways to put

Sudan/South Sudan Mission Network Conference (August 3-4)

They came from east and west, from near and far, from Lincoln, Kearney, and Omaha; from Pittsburgh and Seattle and Washington; from Juba and Malakal; to meet in what author Mary Pipher referred to as the “Middle of Everywhere” and remain. Taking it’s theme from John 1:39, “So they went and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day,” the Sudan/South Sudan Mission Network of the PC (USA) gathered at Eastridge. During our time together, we were reminded of the first disciples who spent time getting to know Jesus. They remained with him as they shared life together. Here are some highlights and pictures of the meeting:

The Rev. Thomas Tut, Moderator of the South Sudan Evangelical Presbyterian Church (SSPEC), led an insightful and interactive time of scripture study. He shared news about his work in Juba and his goal to visit others in need of hope in South Sudan. His goals for the coming year include developing relationships with PC

(USA), churches and many Sudan/South Sudanese partners.

PC(USA) mission co-worker, Sharon Kandel, provided an update about our mission co-workers and partners in South Sudan and Sudan.

We were also grateful for our zoom conversation with the Deputy Director in the Office of the US Special Envoy to Sudan and South Sudan, Andrew Burnett, who provided helpful information about ongoing humanitarian efforts, including working for peace and reconciliation, hunger, education, and health care.

We heard from several South Sudanese pastors and leaders who are living in Lincoln or Omaha. Nyabuoy Chan, a member of our congregation, shared about her work with the ECHO Collective, a local non-profit, as well as her recent trip to the refugee camps where she used her trauma healing training and led worship. We were also excited to have local congregations - Westminster and First, Lincoln - participate in the conference. Our denomination is blessed to have Rev. Jock Paleak, Associate Pastor at First, Lincoln. Jock preached a sermon about

the call to “remain” with Jesus and with each other; followed by a delicious Sudanese meal!

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS JULY: The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting/retreat of June 25, 2022.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Dr. Melodie Jones Poin-ton officiated at the memorial service of Ross Gerding, held at Eastridge Presbyterian Church on July 22, 2022.

The Session affirmed the email vote approving the use of Fellowship Hall for a pasta fundraiser.

The Session approved Eastridge

serving as the host for a presentation by the Rev. Andrew Kukla titled "Money Talks." The event will be on Sunday, October 23, 2022, at 3 p.m. The event is sponsored by the Finance Workgroup of the Administration and Finance Committee of Homestead Presbyterian and funded by the Programs and Grants Committee.

The Session approved the following fundraisers: 1) sale of remaining EPC wooden cutouts by the Eastridge Presbyterian Women, with proceeds to be used for a

mission project to be determined; 2) a music program by Patty Niemann and Diane Worrell Eaton on Sunday, October 2, 2022, at 4 p.m. in the Sanctuary, with proceeds for the Eastridge Community Pantry; 3) payment for the placement of "You've Been Elfed" signs, with proceeds for youth programs; and 4) a sale of items from the 10,000 Villages store at Eastridge on November 13-15, 2022, with proceeds for youth programs.



Eastridge Hospice Singers:

This fall, the Eastridge Hospice Singers will begin their 5th year of "bringing the peace and comfort of music to those journeying through hospice care". With God's blessing and the dedication of our hospice trained singers, it has

been our honor to provide over 500 "in person" and virtual visits to those in hospice care who request our presence during their end-of-life journeys.

Our own personal hospice singing journeys have been filled with the joy of developing relationships with individuals for whom we sing and, in some cases, family members too. The statement below serves as a testament to the power of music and its ability to connect and bind people and their hearts together even at the end of life.

"I was surprised at how much the singers ended up meaning to us. I wasn't expecting it but when my wife and I were unable to communicate well, due to the advancement of her symptoms from Parkinson's, we were still able to sing together when the singers came and that gave us 45 minutes to reconnect in a way that hadn't been possible for a very long time. I'm so thankful and grateful for the program."

It was such a blessing for us to have sung for this couple 23 times during the past year.

Our unique singing ministry is so appreciative of EPC and the support given to us by staff and members of our congregation. Brochures and business cards for the Eastridge Hospice Singers are located on the Welcome Desk. Eastridge Food Pantry: The Food Pantry committee would like to thank Eastridge congregation members for their generosity in food donations recently. After the Moment for Mission plea on Sunday, July 24, the Pantry has collected 596 lbs of food through Thursday, July 28 at mid-day. These donations really help as we continue to serve an expanding number of clients who are facing food insecurity during this inflationary period. We welcome continuing donations. We distributed boxes to 54 households and served 25 (households) in-person shoppers on Wednesday, July 27 (266 people total!)

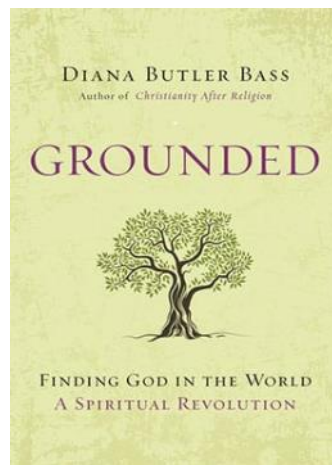
YANA: You Are Not Alone, a group for those who have lost a spouse, meets the first Tuesday of each month for a meal and fellowship.

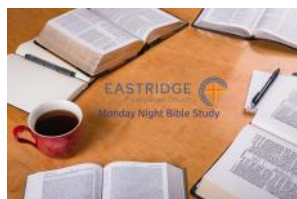

"The call to love our neighbor as ourselves is central to Christian faith and discipleship. Providing for a high-quality public education for all children is a concrete expression of this love. When we allow public schools to fail, we turn away from the mandate to love our neighbor" (statement from The 219th General Assembly of the PCUSA*, 2010). "Public education," schools supported using taxpayer funds, is being attacked across the United States, and now the battleground has spread to Nebraska. Although groups opposing public schools have been active for several decades, a number of anti-public-school coalitions have actively recruited in Nebraska during the past year. It's important for us as parents, grandparents, community members, and voters to be reminded about the Presbyterian tradition that began in Geneva, Switzerland, before our country was founded.

Free public education for all was instituted in Geneva as part of the reformation of society that accompanied the reformation of the church. The growth of literacy helped spread the Reformed church by producing educated ministers and members. The expansion of the Reformed tradition to Scotland contributed to the "Scottish Enlightenment" that resulted in a disproportionate number of inventors in the country. The availability of free public education that was brought to America made it possible for our country to develop and grow into the informed and technologically empowered country we are today.

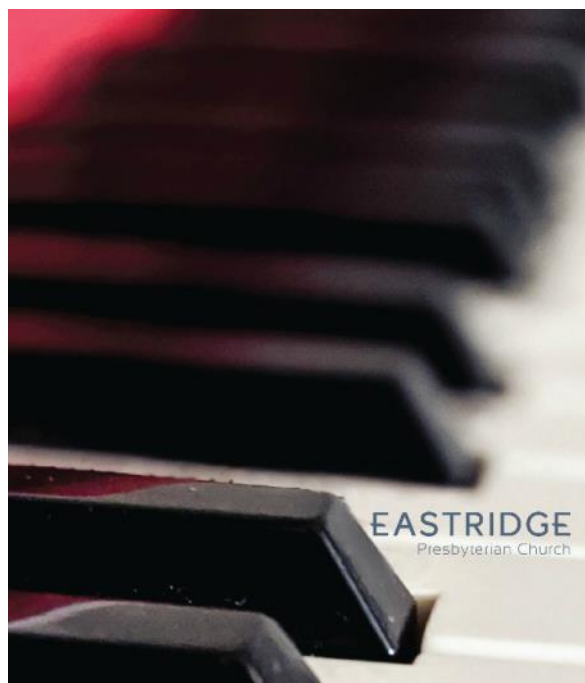

MINISTRY WITH CHILDREN

Faith Connection for Preschool Children: This year we will begin offering our preschool class for 3 year olds through Pre-K during the 9:00am service. 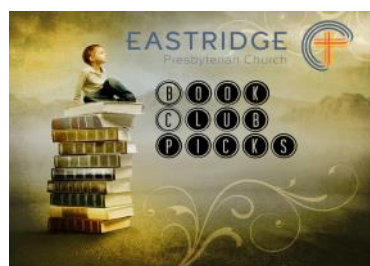

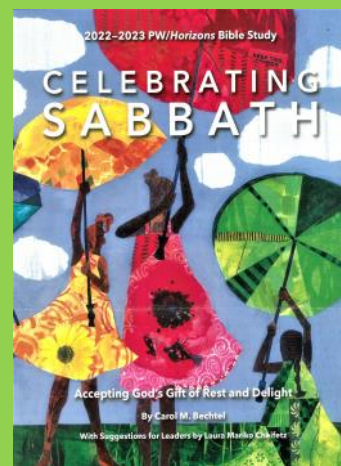
