As soon as we hear the first words, "They were the best of times, they were the worst of times" (A Tale of Two Cities by Charles Dickens); "Little nutbrown hare, who was going to bed, held on tight to big nutbrown hare's very long ears" (Guess How Much I Love You by Sam McBratney); "In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered" (Luke 2:1). From the first words, we know the ending, and everything that happens in the middle: the

dered about the power of a well-known story being told backward - first the ending, then in reverse to the beginning. As we began to wonder aloud about what an Advent series might look like if we were to tell the story backward, we grew more excited about the possibilities. First, obviously, is that from the very first Sunday of Advent we would sing Christmas Carols in worship! When Cottrell wrote his book, he noticed there are parts of the story that largely go untold; that there are looming uncertainties growing more pronounced throughout; the central role of women; the voices that do not speak; and that the beginning of the story goes all the way back to another baby born to set God's people free from slavery -Moses.




FROM THE EPC OUTREACH COMMITTEE:

"The expanded Child Tax Credit program drove down child poverty to a record low of 5.2% in 2021, lifting 2.1 million children out of poverty. In Nebraska 434,000 children and their families benefited from this expansion (Open Sky Policy Institute). The CTC could do more to reduce hunger and poverty among our nation's children than any single policy has in decades: it was estimated that maintaining the expanded CTC would reduce child poverty in the U.S by 50%.

But Congress failed to extend the CTC expansion and it expired at the end of 2021, and food insufficiency increased by 25% in the first six months of the new year (JAMA Network Open).

Currently there is interest in Washington in reviving the expanded Child Tax Credit, and some observers believe that Sen. Sasse might be convinced to support this legislation, which is expected to be introduced before Sasse resigns. Please send him a message: Sen. Ben Sasse, U. S. 


EPC Book Club: Join us on Monday, January 9 as we discuss the book **True Biz by Sara Novic.**


