An update from the Criminal Justice Reform Team:

The Criminal Justice Reform focus group has met with more than ten area organizations to learn about systems that exist in Lincoln and Lancaster County. Individuals representing groups such as the Lancaster County Public Defender's office, the Director of Community Corrections in Lancaster County and the Lincoln Police Department Mental Health and Homelessness Team were asked to provide data on the processes that lead to jail time, deferment options, and assistance for those who are released to lead a successful post incarceration life.

The following problem statement was drafted by the Criminal Justice Focus Team:

"County jails are the front door to mass incarceration. A growing number of people are placed or kept in the Lancaster County Jail for nonviolent offenses because the local system doesn't have sufficient tools, discretion or community-based alternatives to address their needs while maintaining public safety."

Nehemiah (from Micah 6:8) gives us three mandates: JUSTICE, MERCY & FAITHFULNESS. Our

congregation does a great job with mercy ministries and faithfulness. The Justice in Action initiative is asking us to consider justice issues. The Biblical story of Nehemiah provides a powerful example of how justice addresses the root causes of problems to ensure fair treatment of all

people, especially the poor, the widow and the orphan.

So, what does justice look like today? Justice means holding our local leaders accountable for the fair treatment of the most vulnerable people in our community. Jesus was a social justice warrior! He showed us that each one of us can use our



voice to stand up for those who have been silenced, forgotten, or ignored. When we stand together, we have the power to make change.

Please prayerfully consider standing with over 20 other congregations on May 4th at our first annual Nehemiah Rally to show our local leaders that

we stand for the most vulnerable. Our power is in our numbers, so your presence matters!

UPDATES TO FOOD PANTRY

1. Wednesday distribution will only be for in-person shoppers. There will not be drive thru availa-

ble on Wednesdays. We have extended the distribution time to be 4:00-7:00 pm. We have split up the volunteer shift into two shorter shifts, 3:45-5:30 and 5:25 - 7:15 pm. We feel this change will allow us to continue to serve shoppers without duplication of shoppers each week.

2. Sunday distribution will only be for drive-thru boxes. There will be no in-person shopping available on Sundays. This will continue to provide clients the convenience of drive thru. Our drive thru numbers have continued to increase each week and it has become overwhelming to try to fill additional boxes while we have shoppers in the pantry. This will allow us to only focus on drive-thru clients during this time. Also, we will only be giving out one box per family, and an adult family member must be present in the car to receive a box. This means no more people requesting additional boxes for families who are not present.

3. Shoppers will only be allowed to sign up to shop 2 times per month.

4. We will be changing the Sign-Up Genius monthly sign up to stay the same month to month. Signups will be available on an ongoing basis by deleting old dates and adding new dates to the established signup page. There will be one signup for filling boxes, and another for distributions. The distributions signup will have notes indicating if it is for drive-thru or in-person shoppers. The inperson shopping dates will have two shifts listed. The boxing sign up will also have two shifts, as we will be filling a larger quantity of boxes in total for Sunday drivethru. Boxing will only occur on Thursdays due to this change. Each shift will fill the number of boxes shown in the volunteer board. Boxers should only put items in boxes as shown on the sticky notes posted around the pantry or are marked as additional or substitute items for boxes. We are intentional on what items we put into boxes so we can manage our inventory based on the availability of items from the Food Bank.

We hope these changes will make things more manageable for the pantry and make volunteering more appealing to you all. Please feel free to provide us feedback as to how the new changes are going after we have tried it for a couple weeks. The Committee will be meeting again in April to evaluate if the changes are working well or need more adjustments.

The One Great Hour of Sharing Offering is an ecumenical endeavor that now involves nine denominations and Church World Service. Founded in 1946 by Episcopal Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill, the goal was to raise one million dollars in one hour for World Relief. In 1949, church leaders from several denominations began work- At Eastridge this Special Offering is traditionally reing together to promote this effort. Major networks broadcast a show, called "One Great Hour", on Saturday, March 26. The broadcast, featuring President Truman and popular musicians and actors of the time, closed with the request to make a sacrificial contribution at their own place of worship the next morning.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS: The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of February 23, 2023.

The Session acknowledged that communion was served at the 9 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services on March 5, 2023.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Dr. Melodie Jones Pointon officiated at the memorial service of Steve Longacre on February 24, 2023, and the funeral service of John VerMaas on March 7, 2023. Both services were held at Eastridge Presbyterian Church.

A motion was carried to schedule one worship service at 10 a.m. on April 16, 2023, to precede the visioning gathering with Leaderwise.

A motion was carried to allow the Eastridge Neighborhood Association to use the parking lot for the neighborhood cleanup on Saturday, May 6. Two rolloffs will be delivered in the morning and picked up at noon. A shredder will be available from noon to 1 p.m., and a truck from Star City Recycling will be available in the morning.

A motion was carried to regretfully accept the resig-

nation of Dr. Brian Lew, Director of Music Ministries, effective May 31, 2023. The Session expressed its thanks to Dr. Lew for his seven years of service.



Information was received from the Synod of Lakes and Prairies about Synod School, scheduled for July 23-28, 2023, at Buena Vista University, Storm Lake, Iowa. Brochures are available in the church office.

The Personnel Committee reported that two child care providers have been hired. Additional help is still needed.

The Outreach Committee reported that it is looking at methods to increase the number of volunteers for the pantry. The committee also discussed the possibility of future financial contributions to Justice in Action. Bill reported on the activities related to Justice In Action. Session members were asked to sign up to attend the Nehemiah Rally on May 4, 2023.

The World on Your Doorstep: Evangelism and Mission Today

It was Mother's Day in 1953 when a small group of people gathered in the field on the corner of Eastridge Drive and the Sunrise Road in Lincoln, Nebraska. The Strauss Brother's new housing development brought new families into the community at a rapid pace. The young new pastor of what was Countryside Community Church went door to door as families moved into their homes. A new school, a community pool, and welcoming religious communities meant lots of opportunities for involvement. And so the families came - East Campus professors, schoolteachers and administrators, craftsman, and professionals. Rev. Tom Huxtable had no problems welcoming these families, as his outgoing and easygoing personality often led to an invitation to dinner from the family and a promise to come to church the next Sunday. Often, before Huxtable left the table, he also had scheduled gatherings and recruited church leadership. Very quickly, what became Eastridge Presbyterian Church was a vibrant church community at the center of the neighborhood.

Evangelism used to happen on our doorsteps with a smile, a handshake, and an invitation. Mission meant building a new church on the edge of town and sending money and supplies to support the work of missionaries around the world. In these conversations, we'll explore what evangelism and mission are today, with a world on our doorsteps. Beginning with one sentence definitions by our guests, we'll work toward a understanding of how we share our faith today, and why we share it.

Rev. Dr. Christian Walti, Pastor of Friedenskirche Bern/ Switzerland. What to do when your church is way up on a hill and in the midst of a neighborhood that is rapidly becoming more multi-ethnic, multi-religious, and eco-

nomically diverse? You have to come down from that hill. In this episode, Christian shares of his passion for instigating neighborliness within urban anonymity and finding new ways of showing up as church, and what any of this has to do with a restaurant where no purchase is necessary.
