FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN...

It's now clearly fall here in Nebraska. The fields are harvested, the leaves are falling, fall sports seasons are coming to an end, and ads are telling us it's time to think about those holiday meals. Maybe for you this means looking forward to the recipes handed down through the generations. Maybe this year you've decided to treat yourself to one of the catered options in town. Maybe

you're like me, with a newly diagnosed health condition (I was diagnosed with celiac disease in April) that means your menu has been completely overhauled. Maybe you are experiencing food insecurity and wonder what foods will be on your table. Maybe you will spend your time as part of a changed family because of marriage or divorce, birth or death, diagnosis or distance.

I think in every holiday movie I've ever watched, there's always "that guest." You know who I'm talking about - the relative or friend who brings up the forbid-

den topics of politics and religion, who has few social graces, and who overstays their welcome. The most popular version is probably Cousin Eddy from Christmas Vacation, with an RV to pull up in front of the house, a menacing dog, and bad jokes. I'm thankful for the exaggerated version of this "guest," especially as we enter a time of gratitude, joy, and togetherness.

Tables are tricky places, though, especially as we gather together in a time of international tensions and global insecurity. I'm not going to run through the whole list, all you have to do is watch the news. There is war, there is violence, there is political divisiveness, and governments

that are not functioning. This year, it will be difficult to keep these topics off the table at our tables. Added in with tensions in our own lives and families, we may wonder how we will make it through the holidays.

This month, we want to invite you to a different kind of table. Inspired by "The Peace Table: A Storybook Bible," we will follow a peace path that invites us to explore peace with others. Using the story of Abigail in 1 Samuel


and texts from Isaiah, Luke, and Ephesians, we will explore how to be people of peace in our relationships with each other.

Just over a week ago, we were honored to host Bob and Kristi Rice, PCUSA mission co-workers in Juba, South Sudan. As Bob shared with our congregation on Sunday morning, it is the core of the Gospel of Jesus Christ that we be reconciled with God and reconciled with each other. Each of the texts he shared with us, and that we will hear again this month, give example, wisdom, and encouragement to be at peace with God and with each other. Bob went on to say that fundamental to the Heal-

ing Hearts Transforming Nations ministry in which they participate builds on the foundation of forgiveness we find modeled in scripture. On a massive scale, in a country that finds itself more divided than unified, Bob asked how we can be people of peace and reconciliation.

Friends, our world is unsettled right now with divisions and wars. Times are uncertain and tense all around the world. We wonder how these divisions and tensions will affect us?




