This fall we are focusing on Matthew 25, our participation in God's story as it relates to this scripture, and our history as a Matthew 25 congregation of PCUSA. We are inspired by scripture, particularly Matthew 25:31-46, and by our summer reading of Everything Good About God is True, by Bruce Reyes-Chow. Chapter Eight of BRC's book has particularly resonated in our conversations:

What does it mean for God's story to be revealed?

The STORIED revealing of God's hope and intentions is intricately woven

In and through our interactions with God-

A delicate conversation between Creator and created. (pg. 78)

The goodness of God tells us that there is a story that will be revealed. But that is different from a belief that "God's plan" means something predetermined, divinely directed, specific, and even coercive. I believe, instead, that God invites humanity to play a part in God's story.

We get to listen for the many ways God speaks to the world, to question that which needs to be challenged, to shift when the Spirit beckons us in a new direction, and to embrace our roles as coconspirators with beauty and truth and justice and goodness. God's story unfolds in the revealing and realizing of God's plans for the world. (pg. 79)

When we are part of a community, we learn when and how to make our voices known. Are we that voice tenderly whispering in the background or the one boisterous cheering others on? Are we the voice that constantly speaks in solidarity with those who are silenced? Are we part of a chorus of voices shouting and chanting because the concerns of the oppressed are not being taken seriously? Or are we the ones who focus our efforts on listening deeply to others? The Spirit will speak through us in different ways at different times, and the Spirit is made

known to us through the voices of others. (pg.81)

An animating question for this series and accompanying activities is, "Where did we see you?" We acknowledge that many in our community whom we are called to serve experience not only poverty, hunger, imprisonment, loneliness, injustice or infirmity, but also invisibility. We hope to bring into focus our friends and neighbors along with ways we serve now and can serve as God's story is revealed among us.

During this season, we have opportunities to learn and serve in a number of ways. We hope to raise awareness about how Eastridge has anchored our mission activities and giving, as well as to provide opportunities to participate in service to others. Our mission activities in recent years have intentionally been grouped under three main headings: Food and Hunger, Home and Opportunity, and Education and Evangelism. Each month we will focus on one of these areas by way of displays in the Welcome Center and service opportunities.

We also hope to increase awareness of how our physical building has become a significant asset and tool enabling efforts to serve our community through our partnerships with organizations in our area that have found a home here. We hope that as these groups are highlighted in our newsletter we are able to see and hear their participants in a new way.

As we consider the individuals we seek to serve and attempt to see them more authentically, and in the context of Psalm 139, we open ourselves to hearing answers to the question, "What I wish people know about me...." It is our intent to find ways to share insights in many ways over the next three months.

May we all be blessed and challenged by these words of scripture!


### Surviving the Pain and Sorrow of Loss - A Journey Towards Restoring Hope

Personal loss after a death(s) of those who care for leaves many of us with a different identity---" I am a survivor" whether the loss is a traumatic sudden loss, a suicide loss, or a loss of child or adult following a series of medical hardships, leaving survivors searching to help themselves and loved ones to put their shattered lives together. This 90-minute conversation is the beginning of a pro-

cess of sharing tips, wisdom, and techniques to help one another in these times of crisis, the skills to survive and thrive are similar, yet different.

Families will be invited to participate as small groups, with adults, and youth provided separate opportunities to participate after an initial presentation.







#### SESSION HIGHLIGHTS AUGUST 18, 2024

The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of July 14, 2024.

The Session acknowledged that communion was served at the 9:30 a.m. service on August 4, 2024.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Dr. Melodie Jones Pointon officiated at the memorial service of Steve Phillips on August 3, 2024, at Eastridge Presbyterian Church.

The Session approved the wedding of Holly Bingham and

Isaac Ingwersen at 2 p.m. on October 7, 2024. The wedding will be held in the church and officiated by the Rev. Thomas Dummermuth.

Rev. Dr. Jones Pointon expressed thanks for the time she was allowed for sabbatical.

Rev. Dummermuth reported there will be a Discovering Eastridge class at 10:45 a.m. on Sunday, August 25, 2024. Rev. Dummermuth also invited Session members to two upcoming events: "Fellowship Among the Faithful," an event sponsored by the Faith Coalition, which will be held on Wednesday, September 11, 2024, at

Eastridge, and "Surviving the Pain and Sorrow of Loss," sponsored by Faith Partners, on Wednesday, October 9, 2024, at 6 p.m.

Rev. Dr. Jones Pointon reported that the Green Team has organized storage in the church. A+ Academy is now renting the space previously used as the choir room in the basement. The contract with A+ has been updated to reflect this change. A+ will no longer be using Fellowship Hall on a regular basis.

Rev. Dr. Jones Pointon reported that the Memorial and Endowment Committee and EPW agreed to each con-

> tribute half of the cost to purchase chairs with arms to be used in Fellowship Hall. They will replace the folding chairs.

Rev. Dummermuth and Chris Boone reported on the Homestead Presbytery meeting, where a report was received from

the commissioners to General Assembly. It was announced that the Rev. Bruce Reyes Chow will be at Lincoln Westminster on November 9 and 10, 2024. The Nebraska Presbyterian Foundation reported that it is encouraging grant applications.

Ladies Night Out: this group meets for fun outings, mostly "off campus". This past year we visited Wyuka Cemetery and Capitol View Winery.

Eastridge Presbyterian Church became a Matthew 25 congregation in December 2019. As we live out

This program includes our Kindergartners through 5th graders. We gather afterschool and meet until 5:30pm each week.



Our own personal hospice singing journeys have been blessed with developing relationships with the individuals for whom we sing. Whether we sing just once for a person or multiple times, music has a special way of helping ease, and of making more beautiful, the transition from this world to the next. And especially at endof-life, we find that "When words fail, music speaks".

Our unique singing ministry is so appreciative of EPC and the support given to us by staff and members of our congregation.


Bible/Book Study for Adults:




