



From the Pastor's Pen ~


It's Christmastime, again! In just a few short days, our homes, schools, businesses, and doctor's offices will be transformed into a marvelous winter wonderland of snow. The same will happen here in our building as we begin our celebrations of the season. For us, that will include Christmas trees, Christmas lights, and of course, the nativity scene.

Pop quiz! What piece of the nativity do you need to make it a nativity? The angel? The shepherds? The animals? The wise ones? Joseph? Mary? The baby Jesus?

Most nativities have the baby, wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in the manger at the center. Yes, of course, that's the answer to the question. The Oxford Online Dictionary defines nativity as "the occasion of someone's birth." Secondarily, the birth of Jesus Christ. A third definition is "a picture, carving, or model representing Jesus' birth."

This year, our Advent and Christmas theme goes right to the center of the nativity. Yes, I mean the birth of Jesus Christ as represented in the nativities that decorate our homes. Placed at the center is the manger, a common feeding trough for animals.

Nebraska is farm country. We may be known for our beef, but I imagine many of us have experience with feeding troughs for cattle, sheep, pigs, horses, llamas, or chickens. Maybe you also have memories of visits to one of our amazing zoos around feeding time. Maybe you have a beloved pet member of your family and can look at pet food bowls. Choose whichever one of these you like, and then answer this question - who would place a baby in a feeding trough for animals? It's not very practical, really. Until you remember the story of a young couple, about to have a baby, on a journey to fulfill a government requirement and be counted in the census. Nowhere to sleep, even the inn is full. Nowhere to place the newborn baby.



This new young couple wraps their newborn baby in swaddling clothes, and lays him in a manger, because there is no room for them in the inn. In his very first moments of life, the Christ child is placed in a feeding trough, a foreshadowing of the one who would proclaim, "I am the bread of life" in John 6:35. Author and scholar Amy-Jill Levine writes, "The term manger is not just a bed of straw; it is a feeding trough.... Mary places her baby where food is found; how appropriate, for this baby will later take 'the bread . . . saying, 'This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me' (22:19)... More,

the name Bethlehem literally means 'house of bread.'" She continues later, "We should remember the manger in Bethlehem not only at the Last Supper but also in connection to all the passages where Jesus shares a meal with others. Luke depicts the feeding of the five thousand, meals with tax collectors and sinners including Zacchaeus, the three meals with Pharisees, the dinner at Emmaus, and the final meal of broiled fish. Reading Luke should make one hungry, not just for bread, but for more of the story."

This Advent we will jump right into the birth narrative and explore what it means for Jesus to be placed in a manger in a town named "House of Bread." With Christmas and Advent Carol every week, special music every week, and bread eaten around tables every week, we will attend to those manger stories of hunger, thirst, and feasting in Luke's Gospel.

After all, as Jeehei Park, professor of New Testament at Seminary of the Southwest writes, "The manger is where Jesus descends to the lowest place in the world, while at the same time, bonds with his mother on a night of joy and relief, exhaustion and uncertainty."

Come and worship this Advent season, for all has been made ready.




Eastridge Presbyterian Women Cookie Sale is December 8!








The EPC Book Club meets the second Monday of each month September through June at 7:00 pm. Locations vary...check the Welcome Center for info when you arrive!

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS: NOVEMBER 2024

The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of October 13, 2024.

The Session acknowledged that communion was served at the 9:30 a.m. service on November 3, 2024.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Thomas Dummermuth officiated at the memorial service of Lois Coleman on

November 1, 2024, at Eastridge Presbyterian Church.

The Session removed Russell Brauer from the member rolls, deceased November 1, 2024.

The Session acknowledged the elder status of Lois Coleman (ordination date of January 16, 2005) and Clinton Philson (ordination date of January 28, 1968).

The Session affirmed the email vote to approve the report of the Confirmation Task Force. The task force recommended that "Changing the World: Confirmation for the Missional Church," be used as the curriculum, that an informational meeting be held for parents and caretakers of prospective confirmands, and that confirmation include confirmands who are in eighth grade or older.

The Session approved the wedding of Eliza Felix and Benjaman Amen on August 15, 2025.

The Session approved the sale of calendars made by Donna Gustafson as a fundraiser for the music and youth programs.

The Session approved motions from the Personnel Committee 1) to increase payroll by 3 percent, if the way be clear, 2) to amend the contract of Kris Adler Brammer to include a six-week sabbatical after five years of service, and 3) to pay Brent Shaw as summer music coordinator.

The Session approved the pastors' terms of call which will be presented to the congregation at the congregational meeting on November 24, 2024.

The Session heard a report from a meeting with the church's investment manager from Union Bank and Trust.

The Session heard a report from the Nominating Committee for nominees who will be presented to the congregation at the congregational meeting on November 24, 2024.


