From the Pastor's Pen ~

Over the past two months, our series on what it means to be a Matthew 25 congregation has studied the Biblical passage and its call to see Jesus in the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick, and the imprisoned. We've invited a number of our community partners to share with us in worship. We've followed up with conversations on the Sunrise Road podcast. Now we make the turn from studying the passage to identi-

fying how to live out what it means to be a Matthew 25 congregation.

We became a Matthew 25 congregation in December of 2019. Our outreach committee studied the passage as well as the resources provided by the PC(USA). Those resources outline three ways to approach this call: to embrace congregational vitality, to commit ourselves to dismantling structural racism, and to commit ourselves to eradicating systemic poverty. The denominational resource, "Bringing Matthew 25 Into Focus" says this, "Matthew 25:31-46 sets down a general rule: Those in deep human need are to be cared for. How those needs are specifically identified, and what form that care takes, is to be determined by the use of "prudence," and "prudence" is one element of careful, faithful discernment."

The denominational Bible study on Matthew 25 explains the three foci:

Engaging vital communities:

"Building congregational vitality refers to the intentional and continuous faith development of pastors and members of a congregation that leads disciples who are members in a church to actively engage with their community. Congregational vitality is not determined by the size of a church or its budget, but by a church's faithfulness in demonstrating the love and justice of Jesus. One good test of a congregation's vitality is to see how


its members and neighbors answer the question, "If this church were to close, who would miss it and why?" When a congregation is committed to the work and witness of Jesus Christ, its mission becomes an essential part of the local community."

Dismantling systemic racism:

"Dismantling structural racism involves breaking down the laws, policies, practices and structures that reinforce and perpetuate discrimination, bias, prejudice and

oppression of "people of color."

The PC(USA) aligns itself in this work with the teaching of Jesus to love one's neighbor as oneself and to respond to the least of these — people who are marginalized and brushed aside — with compassion and justice. We follow the example of the early Christians, who sought to build new forms of community in which there was no longer Jew or Greek, slave or free, male or female (Galatians 3:28)."



"Eradicating systemic poverty refers to the elimination of the economic exploitation of impoverished people through laws, policies, practices and systems that perpetuate an impoverished state. Eradicating systemic poverty means confronting the systems that create and perpetuate poverty. This area of focus moves beyond the important acts of compassion listed in Matthew 25 — offering compas-

sion to individuals who are hungry and thirsty — to address the factors that cause such outcomes for large groups in our society and world."

As we have connected with our community partners in worship over the past two months, I have been humbled by what we do together as a community. I have also been overwhelmed by what so many of us have individually given of our time and talents. This past Sunday, I shared some of the ways our members have shared mustard seeds of God's love for us in Jesus Christ:

- *The pew friend who takes a bulletin back to their retirement community every week and sits with a friend who is no longer able to attend in person.
- *The prayer shawl, lovingly stitched into a quilt, intercepted in the mail by a person who really needed it, and says, "I can't believe someone would make such a beautiful quilt for someone else! Someone who doesn't even go to your church!"
- *The director of a local non-profit who exclaims, "Your congregation is involved in everything good in town!"
- *The college student, who finds themselves homesick while home on break, and so thinks, "I can go to the church!"
- *The child who asks their parents to take them to church.
- *The yoga instructor who is building community in every class.
- *The 110 children in the building every weekday.

- *The food pantry client who takes cans of peas and turns them into delicious biryani for the workers.
- *The teenager who texts a youth mentor while standing at the washing machine, asking for laundry advice.
- *The Bible study who shares prayer requests, and yes, beliefs and opinions, even knowing they are not shared by everyone else in the study.

I then asked the question, "If our church closed its doors tomorrow, what would you miss? What would the community around us miss? What would the world miss?"

Some of you shared your answers:

- *My faith family.
- *My Bible study group.
- *Everything. Just everything. Everyone here. The music. The message. Everything.

Friends, what a blessing it is to be able to share our faith together in this place at this time. I am so very thankful for you.




Westminster Presbyterian Church is hosting our friend Bruce Reyes-Chow on Saturday, November 9 and Sunday, November 10.








The **EPC Book Club** meets the second Monday of each month September through June at 7:00 pm. Locations vary...check the Welcome Center for info when you arrive!

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS: OCTOBER 13, 2024

The Session approved the minutes of the Session meeting of September 8, 2024.

The Session acknowledged that communion was served at the 9:30 a.m. service on October 6, 2024.

The Session removed Dale Ruhl from the member rolls, deceased September 25, 2024, and acknowledged that the Rev. Dr. Melodie Jones Pointon officiated at the memorial service on October 7, 2024, at Lincoln Memorial Funeral Home.

The Session acknowledged that the Rev. Thomas Dummermuth officiated at the wedding of Holly Bingham and Isaac Ingwersen on October 7, 2024, at Eastridge Presbyterian Church.

The Session affirmed the email vote to approve a special offering for the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program.

The Session acknowledged Lisa Guill as an affiliate member.

The Session approved a motion to have Christmas Eve services at 5 p.m. (family service with children's Christmas play) and at 7 p.m. (candlelight service with choirs).

The Session approved a motion to allow a youth fundraiser which will offer items from 10,000 Villages.

The Session approved a motion to establish a task force to develop a plan for confirmation class this year.

The Session heard a report from the conveners for the Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany season, and for January and February 2025.

The Session approved the serving of communion each Sunday during Advent and on Christmas Eve.

The Session approved an intergenerational fellowship event at the Lincoln Community Playhouse for "The Best Christmas Musical Ever", and to provide scholarships for anyone who asks.
