

From the Pastor's Pen:

I am one of those people who have long loved that Jesus was a teacher who told stories. Maybe because it takes me back to the days of my early childhood, sitting on my preschool teacher's knee (she was also my aunt - the rest of the class sat on the floor), listening to her read a story before naptime. I continued to love teachers that told stories to teach a lesson, which may be why I was drawn to study history. (Not the memorize-the-dates kind of history, but a learn-the-stories-of-the-individuals kind of history.) My best score in a math class was in college, when the professor used real life story problems from his apple orchard to teach the class how to solve equations.

So it's always made sense to me that in the middle of a crowd, on a hillside, at a table, with friends, strangers, adversaries, and family Jesus would tell a story. We call them parables.

Parables aren't just stories, though. And they're more than stories with a point. Parables are like gems with many facets that can be studied and interpreted in many different ways. Let's take that a step further even, as we consider the revelatory ability of parables. In his book, Proclaiming the Parables, scholar Tom Long says, "All of Jesus' parables, implicitly or explicitly, say, "The kingdom of God is like this." To wrestle with a parable is to be guided (or pushed) to the brink of mystery, to those places in life where God's reign is revealed." Jesus's parables make a claim about who God is, what God is like, and invite us to experience the Kingdom of God. Using ordinary events, people, and objects, these stories reveal God's character and invite us to experience the coming Kingdom.

As we continue through this sermon series in February, we'll also be welcoming the participation of children and youth in this experience of the reign of God. This, too, speaks to the power of the parable. Stories draw us in. It's hard to resist a good story. Again, this is how the gem continues to be turned as we realize that the simplest lesson and the complex lesson can both be true! Neither lesson, though, when it comes to the parables is as important as experiencing for just a moment what the Kingdom of God is like. "What is the kingdom? Well, it's like a man who had two sons, it's like a woman mixing yeast into flour." We have an image in our mind of a man with two sons, we can smell the yeasted flour as it bakes in the oven and is transformed into bread. We experience the Kingdom through these everyday scenarios that are all around us.

Long wants to say that we are changed by the parables, just as Jesus's hearers were. Another mystery,


as some are changed and some are not. Some hear stories that are a nice transition to naptime, and some come away understanding something they could never put into words.

Unless they told a parable.


