




From the Pastor's Pen:

It's hard to believe that it was just last week the (hopefully) last polar vortex of the season held our region in a deep, deep freeze. As the temperatures now look to be holding steady above freezing, it feels like spring has coming bursting through the door. Signs of it are everywhere as my personal calendar fills up with soccer, baseball, concerts, volleyball, and (of course) Lent. Yes, it's true. It's a late Lent and Easter this year. With Ash Wednesday starting next Wednesday, March 5, it's time for us to talk about sin.

Sin. It's a concept that's gone in and out of vogue over the centuries. As you'll hear in our first Sunrise Road Podcast of the year, sin has a troubled history in the church. Some of us may remember learning about sins of omission and commission, individual and communal sin, original sin and inherited sin. Some of us may have stayed away from the church because of its insistence that sin has a hold on our lives and that to receive



deadly sins can be traced back to fourth century Egyptian monk named Evagrius of Pontus, who first named eight temptations. Over the centuries, that original list of eight was sort of agreed upon with the seven deadly sins you might be familiar with today: wrath, greed, sloth, envy, gluttony, lust, and pride.

For me, though, an exploration of sin cannot just be about sin. Yes, I believe it's important to confess our sin -brokenness-wrongdoing. I believe confession is not an end, but is a way to healing, forgiveness, and restoration. In the end, I agree with British author and podcast-

> er Elizabeth Oldfield when she says, "I want a luminous soul." And, "My deepest fear is not being fully alive."²

What does it mean to be fully alive? In her book, Fully Alive: Tending to the Soul in Turbulent Times, Oldfield says, "Fully aliveness, for me, is summed up in connection, and my definition of sin is everything working against that."₃ An exploration of these seven temptations or sins might just lead to a spiritual transfor-

God's goodness and grace we must pray a prayer acknowledging our sinfulness. Others of us find the beginning of our faith in our beloved createdness and work our way around to sin as a way to express frustration at hurts and wrongs in our lives and world. My definition of sin is anything that keeps us from abiding with God and loving one another.

Our Lenten journey this year will be guided by an exploration of the seven "deadly" sins. As the session started our study to prepare for this season, one person remembered studying those seven deadly sins - or most of them. If you're not familiar with them, the seven

mation that allows us to be fully alive. How can understanding wrath lead us from polarization to peacemaking; greed lead us from stuffocation to gratitude and generosity; sloth lead us from distraction to attention; envy lead us from status anxiety to belovedness; gluttony lead us from numbing to ecstasy; lust lead us from objectification to humanism; pride lead us from individualism to community? How does this all lead us to be fully alive? As we journey towards Lent, how does engaging in spiritual practices transform us and our celebration of Christ's resurrection?

It is our hope and prayer that in tending to our souls together we will find companionship for whatever turbulence we are facing individually, as a community, and as a world.


