





From the Pastor's Pen:

As we ended our lent book study on Elizabeth Oldfield's book, "Fully Alive: Tending to the Soul in Turbulent Times," I asked two last questions that also served as prayers. First, what new thing do you perceive God is doing in your life? Second, what new thing do you perceive God is doing in our community? And here I'll add a third, what new thing do you perceive God is doing in

our world? My overall argument here is that God is up to something in our lives, in our community, and in our world, if we perceive it.

Many of you may recognize that is scriptural - from Isaiah 43:19. The whole verse reads,

"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth; do you not perceive it?

I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." (from the New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition).

That is the resurrection hope, isn't it? That even in the midst of turbulent and chaotic times, God is present doing new things. That's why we sing so loud on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. Yes, it's the joy of having the family of faith together, waving palm branches. Yes, it's singing the songs we love at full voice.

As we enter May, I have a couple of requests for our family of faith.

One is to be kind and gracious to each other. This is a time of celebrations and new beginnings! New beginnings also mark the end of what has been. So let's be kind and gracious in recognizing what has gone before

and what is about to spring forth.

The second is to be kind and gracious to ourselves. It really hits home that "Maycember" is at least as busy as December. Spring and summer sports are up and running, there are weddings, baptisms, graduations, recognitions, gatherings to celebrate the end of the school/program year, and concerts. We'll also throw in the Lincoln Marathon, Mother's Day, and Memorial Day. Let's not forget our community efforts with the




JUSTICE, MERCY & FAITHFULNESS -Micah 6:8

KIRK RINGERS ANNIVERSARY!

The Kirk Ringers will share their last school year Sunday on May 25 (Memorial Day weekend) and have treats after church celebrating half a century of our handbells!

The set of Eastridge's original 25 handbells was purchased in February 1974 using a gift of \$800. (Worth about 18 thousand today). By December 1975, there was an adult handbell choir and a youth handbell choir. Mary Jane Huxtable was the first director of the adult choir. The names were announced in April 1976-Kirk Bell Ringers for the adult choir and Joy Bell Choir for the youth choir.

An additional bell was given by Evelyn Morris in honor of her husband, Olin, for their 53rd wedding anniver-

sary on June 12, 1991. Joyce Loudon directed the junior high bell choir from 1991-1996, and Nancy Nemec directed a younger group on chimes.

In 1998, Memorial and Endowment funds were used to purchase robes for the Kirk Bell Ringers, table covers (our current covers were stitched by member LaDonna Grubbs!), and an Orff instrument—all for \$2,000.

As a side note, Sharon Irvin's mother, Donna Stalcup, directed the Kirk Ringers starting in 1986.



Our own George Kilpatrick has published a book! It's called "The Final Few" and will be available for checkout soon. Synopsis: The year is 2080, fifty years after a large asteroid

crashed into the earth, killing 99 percent of its inhabitants and destroying the infrastructure that supported civilization. The few people that survived scratch out a meager existence hunting small animals, fishing, and gathering the few fruits and vegetables that grow wild on the new earth. This is a story that begins in a community of thirty-two living on the shore of a lake.

After fifty years of dim semidarkness caused by the smoke, ash, and debris that has circled the earth since the disaster, the sun has reappeared, and more plants have begun to grow, raising hopes for a brighter future. But those hopes are dashed when the fish in the lake that supported them through the dark days grow scarce.

Conflict wracks the small community as the leadership insists that they can survive where they are, while the younger generation seeks to explore and rediscover the world beyond. A political miscalculation and a clever ploy by one of the young residents results in approval of an expedition consisting of five members with vastly different skills and conflicting goals.

The expedition is wrought with danger, discovery, and surprising plot turns. Meanwhile, death in the community left behind upsets and challenges anything they have ever known. It will take courage, intelligence, strength, cooperation, and faith for any of them to survive.
