From the Pastor's Pen...

Last summer, a book came across my desk, with a title that instantly drew me in. It is written by pastor and author Jill Duffield, "Appreciate These Things: Eight Ways of Cultivating Compassion." It was really a few words of that title:

Appreciate. Cultivate. Compassion.

Following our Advent and Christmas theme "What do you fear: Insisting on Hope," we were drawn to the natural next step that Duffield's book offered. She draws on Paul's words to the church in Philippi, "Finally, beloveds, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think on these things." While this passage is well-known to many of us, it often appears on its own as an inspirational blessing. When we put it back in its context of the letter, we remember that Paul is writing to the Philippians from a jail cell. "Both are experiencing extreme pressure to back off from their proclamation of the crucified and risen Messiah," according to scholar Jane Lancaster Patterson. They are living under personal, social, and political tension.

Appreciate. Cultivate. Compassion.

Appreciate: "More and more I've come to believe in the need to appreciate. More specifically, to appreciate people, the ones right in front of us, here and now." I recently received a letter from someone who shared that they now have a caregiver come to their home several times a week. "It's because of my old age," they wrote. And then noted, "I'm so thankful for their company and their help."

Seeds, plants, and crops, we can also "tend to" our souls. Yes, this is another invitation to participate in spiritual practices. I honestly believe that the upcoming season of short cold days is an opportune time to engage in cultivating our souls through these practices.

Compassion: Duffield notes that it's hard to see others and ourselves for what we are in a world that often reminds us what we're not. Our Christian faith professes that we are not perfect - only God is perfect. This knowledge can be freeing and help us to appreciate each other for the characteristics and traits that make us who we are. Paul is kind enough to list eight characteristics in the community that he appreciates: whatever is true, honorable, just, pure, pleasing, commendable, excellent, and praiseworthy.

Paul then tells the Philippians to "think" on these things. Lancaster Patterson offers further translations of the Greek word used there: "tally up," "be attentive to," "notice," "appreciate." All these words remind me of Mary, pondering in her heart, meditating on all that she had heard and seen. I believe that we can change the world. I know that makes me an optimist, a dreamer, and maybe

even a fool. I don't care. I still believe it. I believe it starts with each one of us, and spreads as we share it with others. This hope that we insist on - that is greater than our fear - that allows us to

Appreciate. Cultivate. Compassion.

"I'd like to move to admiration and even to awe of the people and creatures with whom I share this earth. I'd like to think that a generosity of spirit might be a means of resistance to the contempt that threatens to render all of us extinct. Perhaps appreciation could draw us into a curious proximity that reveals our inextricable and our muchresisted need for one another."


Make a joyful noise to the Lord!


